The American Airpower Heritage Museum and Commemorative Air Force Museum are world renowned for their authentic World War II artifacts, the world's largest collection of nose art and the annual Fina Air Sho in October (See Page 12). The museum houses 40,000 square feet of handson permanent exhibits that detail the story of World War II airpower, an exhibit that also features 13-18 aircraft. The museum's nose art gallery features 33 original

panels officially designated by the National Trust for Historic Preservation as an official project of Save America's Treasures.
